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# JASMINE

## FROM FOSTER CARE TO ADVOCATE

I entered foster care at 16 years old and was placed in the home of “Aunt” Nessa, as I liked to call her. Few people knew of my situation; it was our little secret. I was embarrassed by the family dysfunction that led me to this strange place in my life, and with the support of my SCO case workers, I realized that education was my way out.

My goal was to attend Spelman College. I faced some naysayers; guidance counselors who said it was too expensive, others who felt I would never get in. But my SCO case workers and staff supported my decision. They stayed on top of me, making sure I filled out every document and scholarship. It was the staff’s unwavering support and positive reinforcement that sustained me.

I was accepted to Spelman with scholarships from several organizations as well as financial support from SCO’s education and permanency program, which helped me afford my housing.

But that was just the start of my journey. During summer break, I earned an internship volunteering with foster youth and their families through AmeriCorps that changed my life. I didn’t want any special treatment, so no one at my job was aware of my status as a foster youth. But as I worked in the family visiting room, much like a fly on the wall, I watched young people about my age visiting with the children they had lost custody of, some pregnant again. I saw a vicious cycle happening before my eyes.

It was that summer I realized that as a woman of color, as a foster youth, and as a human being who just cares, it would be a disservice if I didn’t take advantage of my unique pairing of lived experiences and desire to affect change.

Today, I am at Teachers College Columbia University earning my Masters in Clinical Psychology on a full scholarship, so that I, too, can be a source of support for youth in need.

## LEARNING

**93%** of graduates at SCO's high school for over-age, under-credited students received a NYS Regent's diploma.

**96%** of 12th graders in SCO's Family Foster Care program graduated high school, with **65%** enrolled in post-secondary education.

**97%** of children in SCO's Early Childhood Centers met or exceeded national literacy performance standards.

## WORK

**82%** of students at our residential school for youth with high-functioning autism are actively involved in weekly internships in the community.

**4 OUT OF 5** runaway or homeless youth leaving our transitional living program are engaged in educational pursuits or gainful employment.

**368** participants in our Young Adult Workforce Program at Rikers Island completed our program to become licensed drivers to improve their employability.

## WELL-BEING

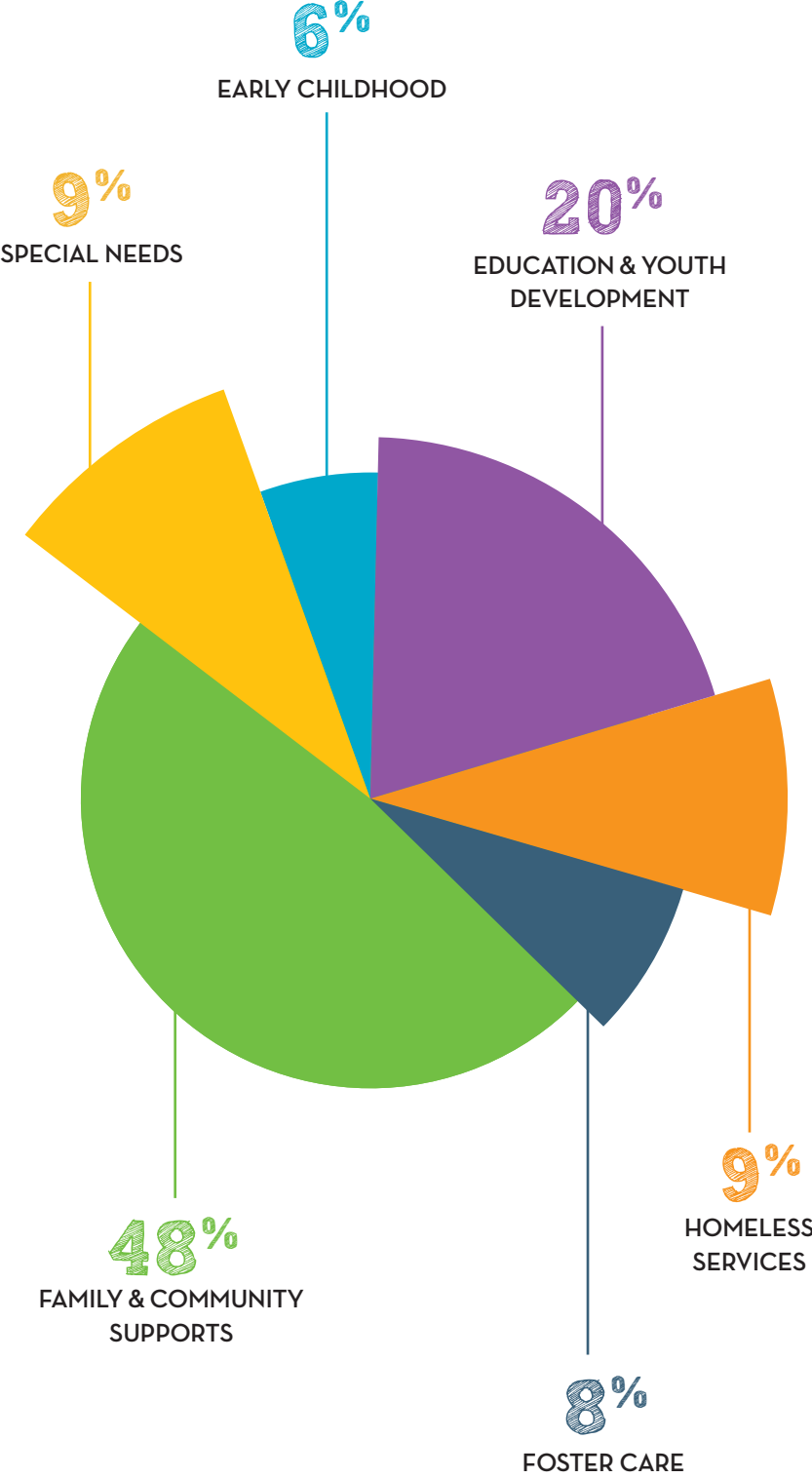
**99%** of at-risk families throughout Brooklyn and Queens remained together and stable with family support services.

**100%** of participants in our award-winning Fathers' Program met their goals by improving their relationship with their children, financial commitment to their children, and/or connecting to essential services.

**85%** of children with complex behavioral health needs discharged from SCO's Bridges to Health program are successfully living at home and in the community, averting the need for more restrictive institutional care.

We helped **40%** more adults with developmental disabilities in our Day Habilitation program attain higher levels of socialization and independence at 3 new locations.

# OUR PROGRAMS

## EARLY CHILDHOOD

- Nurse-Family Partnership: home-based program to promote healthy pregnancy and child development
- Parent-Child Home Program: home-visiting program that promotes parent engagement, early literacy and school readiness
- Early Head Start: center and home-based childcare and parenting support for families with infants and toddlers
- Early Childhood Centers: early care and education, preschool and pre-K
- Family Child Care Networks: childcare in small group settings

## EDUCATION AND YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

- Close to Home: residential program for court-involved youth
- Juvenile Justice Initiative: intensive therapy to prevent and change delinquent behavior
- Transfer Schools: high schools for over-age, under-credited students
- After School and Summer programs for school-age youth
- Young Adult Workforce Program: educational and vocational services for young adults on Rikers Island
- Drop-In Center: resources and services for homeless and at-risk youth

## STRONG FAMILIES & COMMUNITIES

- Center for Family Life: neighborhood-based services in Sunset Park, Brooklyn
- Beacon Community Centers
- United for Brownsville: a collective impact initiative focused on young children and their families
- Fatherhood Initiative: parenting skills workshops, peer mentoring and support services
- Care Management: a program that manages health care, behavioral health and service needs of children and young adults to ensure all goals are met
- Family Counseling, Support and Preventive Services
- Adult Employment, Education and Co-op Business Development
- Single Stop: access to public benefits, healthcare, tax filing, and legal assistance

  - Madonna Heights RTF, Group Residence and School for young women healing from trauma
  - Robert J. McMahon Children's Center and Tyree Learning Center for youth with developmental disabilities
  - The Christopher School for adolescents with developmental disabilities
- Developmental Disabilities
  - Individual Residential Alternatives: small group homes serving adults
  - Intermediate Care Facilities: residential programs with 24-hour nursing care
  - Home & Community Based Waiver, Day Habilitation and Community Habilitation services: enable adults and children to remain at home and engage in community life
  - Family Care: support and guidance in family homes for adults with developmental disabilities
  - Family Support and In-Home Respite for families/caregivers

  - Substance Abuse Recovery Programs
  - Children and Family Treatment and Support Services

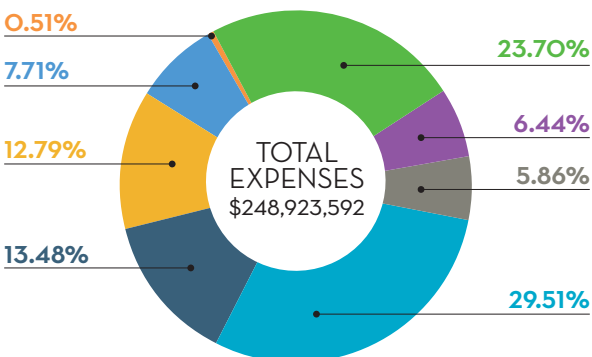
